THE GREEN RIVER RENDEZVOUS

Out in the Far West where three great river systems find their source, lies the Land of the Rendezvous. In the early days these streams and the surrounding mountains abounded in valuable fur bearing animals. The large British fur companies had found this area at the turn of the 19th Century, and in a short while enterprising Americans seeking furs came into conflict with the British interests in the West.

These trappers and adventurers were hardly into the Wilderness when churchmen and missionaries were with him carrying the word of God and the American flag into a land that was still to be acquired by the United States. Sublette County at this time was the extreme southeast

corner of the Oregon Territory. Here the mighty Green River, queen of all the beaver waters, was a Mecca for trappers and Indians.

A short survey of the fur trade in the Rocky Mountains reveals that trappers had covered the West from what is now Mexico to Canada and from the Mississippi to the Pacific in a short period of 16 years. Beginning with Colter, in 1807, Hoback, Reznor, Robinson, Hunt, Lewis and Clark, and Robert Stuart, followed by William Ashley (who originated the Rendezvous), brought together what can be considered the greatest group of continental explorers ever to assemble in any one place. Such men such as Smith, Bridger, Carson, Meeks, Prevost, Bonneville, Fontenelle, Campbell, Fitzpatrick, Fraeb, Gervais, and many other too numerous to mention.

Intermingling with these were the missionaries such as Lee, Parker, Spaulding, Whitman and DeSmet. From the far reaches of the wild country, trappers and Indians congregated at Rendezvous on the banks of the Green River to trade their catches of the past winter season for supplies, and to discuss their findings and wanderings. Pausing at this spot in 1836, were Mrs. Whitman and Mrs. Spaulding


who crossed the continent with their husbands to establish a mission in Oregon. They were the first white women to blaze the way for the thousands to follow their brave example.

The Rendezvous assemblage num-

bered in the thousands. Six of these great gatherings were held in Sublette County. They occurred in the years: 1832, 1835, 1836, 1837, 1839, and 1840. No official representative of any government is known to have taken part in these earliest explorations. It was the fur industry, the trapper, and the missionary that opened the gates of the west. Their hardship have never been surpassed and their courage and fortitude seldom equaled.

It is the aim of the Green River Rendezvous Pageant Association to perpetuate this important period of American history so vital to the development of the West by reenacting annually in pageant form some historical incidents from that distant day.

To all those who made their Rendezvous in Sublette County, we of today gather to honor them by commemorating those occasions of over one hundred years ago. Tread gently, for you walk upon hallowed ground.

CAST OF CHARACTERS

John Hoback Eric Schneider

A Kentuckian and explorer who was the guide for Wilson P. Hunt and the Astorians.

Jacob ReznorJake Brunette

Also from Kentucky, he assisted Hoback and Robinson in guiding the Astorians through the Green River Valley and beyond.

Edward RobinsonTyler Wilson

He, John Hoback, and Jacob Reznor, employees of John Jacob Astor Fur Company, led the group called the Astorians across the Bighorn Mountains using Powder River Pass as the means of passage.

Wilson Price HuntEric Maichak

He named the Hoback River to honor his guide, John Hoback, who led them down this tributary to the Snake River into Jackson Hole.

Pierre DorionAdam Eatinger

Considered "a shrewd, hard-twisted, semiliterate half-breed," he lived intermittently with the Yankton Sioux Indians for 20 years prior to the arrival of the explorers. In dire need of a Sioux interpreter, the Americans paid Dorion not only an interpreter's salary, but also purchased from him 300 pounds of buffalo grease, "which we use to repel insects."

Old Man Indian.....Clete Lamere

Capt. BonnevilleMark Eatinger

Bonneville's place in history is that of an explorer as well as a fur trader. His wanderings in the wilderness gratified his curiosity and his susceptibility to the grand and the beautiful.

Joe WalkerVan Huffman

Walker was a member of the Bonneville and Fremont Expeditions and was also the first sheriff in Independence, Missouri.

Moses "Black" HarrisTy Huffman

An early Black mountain man who is credited as assisting in the location of the site for Fort Laramie and for helping in its original construction.

Harris' BrideJane Thompson

Jim BridgerJon Mickelson

The "Daniel Boone" of the Rockies, a graduate from the school of the mountains and without parallel as a superb scout and guide.

William SubletteBernie Holz

Best known of five brothers, a sound trader, and fearless mountain man. Sublette County is named for the Sublette Brothers.

Kit Carson Eric Schneider

A rare combination of dauntless courage, true nobility of mind and generous impulse, tempered with discretion and sound sense.

He was a tall, silent man and never used tobacco or profanity. He was the most famous of all "Mountain Men".

Joe MeekDave Vlcek

He attended his first Rendezvous, at the age of 19, near present day Lander.

The Shoshones:

In general, these were stout, well formed, active men. They were cheerful, and fond of gambling and amusement. They were also expert marksmen and good riders. Their squaws were said to be excellent housekeepers and mothers.

A man of unbounded energy, fearless. He was practical and intolerant of opposition. His ambition was to monopolize the fur trade regardless of cost.

Tom FitzpatrickGrant Golden

A famous mountain man and partner of Sublette. He was willful, bold and daring.

Sir William Drummond StewartJared Rogerson

A martinet and one with a temper. Competent, meticulous, and exacting, hunting and fishing his reason for coming to the west.

Antoine ClementRJ Thompson

He was a famous hunter and Stewart's head man.

Lucien FontenelleDennis Fornstrom

He is a shadowed man, this Fontenelle, and legends have gathered around his name. He was of noble French blood, some say of Royal blood.
